**TOPIC: Evoking, Suggesting, and Murmuring At the Piano:
Franz Liszt and the Seeds of Impressionism**

How exactly did the modern piano--a percussive instrument which produces its sound through the force of hammers striking strings--come to be called upon to conjure up vivid sights, sounds, scents, and sensations? To evoke the atmosphere of pagodas in the Far East, to paint reflections in the water, to stir up the sounds and scents whirling in the evening air, and to murmur a seductive siren song? Today, we often take this miraculous evocative ability of Impressionistic music for granted, and while Debussy and Ravel are largely credited for opening up these imaginative musical possibilities, the groundwork for their achievements were actually laid half a century before by Franz Liszt. The presentation will take us through an exploration of the evocative writing of Liszt's nature pieces and his pioneering techniques in achieving vivid sensory and pictorial suggestion at the piano. Highlighting various works from the Années de pèlerinage, various études, and the Franciscan Legends as case studies, we will discover the innovative characteristics of Liszt's evocative language before drawing connections to selected works by Debussy and Ravel, ultimately uncovering the ways in which Liszt sowed the seeds of the pianistic Impressionism.

About the Presenter:

Born in Hong Kong and raised in the Pacific Northwest, pianist Thomas Lee enjoys a diverse career as a performer and teacher of the instrument. As both a solo and collaborative pianist, he has performed extensively around the region and on King FM radio, as well as throughout the United States and abroad. Notable engagements include performances at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall, as well as concerto performances with the UW Symphony Orchestra and the Kostroma Symphony in Kostroma, Russia. Thomas has claimed top prizes at the National Federation of Music Clubs Young Artist Competition, Buono & Bradshaw International Piano

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Competition, American Fine Arts Festival International Concerto Competition, along with many regional competitions.

Thomas holds degrees from Rice University, Indiana University, and the University of Washington, where he studied piano under the tutelage of Jon Kimura Parker, Andre Watts, and Craig Sheppard, respectively. As a teacher, Thomas has enjoyed working with students across the spectrum both privately and in university programs -- from the youngest beginners to advanced teens and adults, including a number who have gone on to become university piano majors. Thomas currently teaches out of his private studio in North Seattle, and for the Pugets Sounds Piano School.
